# **Broadband Pole Inventory Begins**

WEC and CVFiber collaboration, first stage of rollout, to be completed by end of 2021

VFiber, one of three Communications Union Districts (CUDs) in WEC's territory and a partner in broadband rollout. launched a pole inventory project in August. Over three phases, the project will collect data on utility poles throughout CVFiber member towns in preparation for building infrastructure to support fiber. WEC members are likely to see workers and vehicles with CVFiber.net signs assessing poles through the rest of 2021.

Approximately 12,100 poles in CVFiber's service area are WEC poles, according to CVFiber representative and finance committee

chair Ray Pelletier. The first phase, currently underway, inventories poles in the towns of Calais, East Montpelier, Middlesex, Moretown, and Worcester. The second phase, encompassing seven towns (yet to be named) launches later this month, and the final phase (five towns, yet to be named) later this fall.

Three companies will complete the pole inventory: The Apex Group, Eustis Cable Enterprises, and Tilson Technology Management. The data

If funding, materials, and labor come through as planned, CVFiber's plan is to halve the number of households with substandard internet in its district by the end of 2022. That would require hanging about 300 miles of fiber. Another 300 miles in 2023 would make affordable high speed internet available to 80 percent of those underserved today. By 2024, internet would reach 95 percent of those who lack it now.

Pelletier, is valuable for CVFiber in terms of system design, preparation, and construction. It's also a useful, up to the minute inventory for WEC. "We're collecting over 50 pieces of information and a photo for each pole. How tall is the pole, how old is the pole, what's already attached to the pole, will it possibly need replacing?" he listed. All pole inventory work will be funded through state grants.

## Each leg of the relay

The process is strategically designed to be sequential and as efficient as possible. Imagine a relay, in

which a runner completes a lap and passes the baton to a second runner. The second runner is ready to go not tying her shoes—when the first runner comes around the bend.

In the same way, CVFiber plans to have its pole inventory completed and a contract for high level design in place by the time construction funding—by way of a low interest loan through WEC's lender Rural Utilities Service—comes through.

The high level design work

## Governor Appoints GM Patty Richards to Chair Vermont Community Broadband Board

n July, Governor Phil Scott announced the appointment of WEC General Manager Patty Richards to serve as Chair of the newly established Vermont Community Broadband Board (VCCB).

"I am honored and excited to serve the state in this important role," said Richards. "This critical infrastructure will open doors and invite opportunity for not only economic prosperity but also education, health care, and essential service, just like electricity, and everyone in our state should have access to high speed internet. The work we do through the VCBB will help deploy fiber with goals of transparency, accountability, and immediacy."

The VCBB was created through Act 71, an act relating to accelerated community broadband deployment, to assist and accelerate community efforts to achieve universal access to reliable, high-speed broadband service. The VCBB will be

# **Relief Efforts**

Grants to pay utility bills offered again, capital credit refunds on November bills, and broadband pole inventory begins

### More VCAAP grants available for COVID-related arrearages

Patty: The Department of Public Service [DPS], our regulators, has announced a second round of funds available to help those members who are late on their electric bills due to COVID related hardship. I encourage members with outstanding bills, if you have been impacted by the pandemic in any way, go ahead and apply for VCAAP funds. The Department is generous with allocating funds for those who are past due. It helps us lower our outstanding balance of unpaid bills. Our arrears are typically \$80,000 to \$90,000, and to date, they are running \$250,000.

**Steve**: This should be a concern for all members. It's important to work with

our members whose ability to work and pay their utility bills have been impacted by the pandemic. All should also recognize WEC has fixed costs. We have to pay for the power and the upkeep of the infrastructure and the salaries of our employees who keep it all working. We're a not for profit and we have no rainy day funds. Any time we can't collect revenue, it's other members who have to pick up the slack.

I'm glad the DPS has made additional money available for members and Vermonters who need this, and I hope those who could really benefit the most have the ability to access these funds.

**Patty**: It's online for those with internet, and you can also call in. WEC Member Services staff can help

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you navigate the steps and the DPS will walk people through the process as well. Our Member Services team is making calls to people who are 60 days late on their bills. We are doing our best to get the word out.

**Steve**: The bigger a problem gets, the harder it is sometimes to deal with it. It's important for a cooperative like WEC to help our members find pathways out of this. We are hit like the rest of the state, and we're here to help. No one wants to be in this position, but help is available.

Patty: We're extending bill payment plans over more than a year. Depending on the circumstances, we might go beyond two years. The DPS and PUC [Public Utility Commission] announced the moratorium ended July 15. We are not rushing out to disconnect anybody, but the disconnects will begin eventually. Anyone with a payment plan with us will avoid disconnect. Reach out to us to access VCAAP funding or to set up a payment plan. We'll work with you to figure out what you need. The worst thing you can do is not call us back, because that will result in a disconnect.

## Patty appointed chair of state Broadband board

Steve: Governor Scott appointed Patty to chair the Vermont Community Broadband Board. I'm happy Patty's received this recognition. All of us wish her well and hope this board is effective in facilitating rural broadband once and for all! With Patty's experience leading our rural Co-op and the rural broadband effort at WEC, she's a good fit for this board. I hope the board serves the state well, and I expect it will.

**Patty**: I'm really honored to be on this board and to be chairing it. Our first task is to discuss planning and what our rollout steps will look like. Christine Hallquist is the executive director, and she'll have staff available to facilitate disbursement of funds once the Broadband Board approves grants. Our goal is to get funds out quickly and to successfully bring high speed, reliable, high quality service to those underserved in the state. It's a really big initiative, and I take it seriously. I can't wait to dive in and get going.

### **Broadband update**

**Patty**: We're applying for a major loan with our lender, RUS [Rural Utilities Service]. We applied with CVFiber for a grant from the DPS and signed the contract documents in late July for a \$200,000 grant to initiate a high level design study.

**Steve**: WEC is continuing with the process to partner with other not for profit Communication Union Districts [CUDs] as a way of providing access to broadband to our members with the least risk to them as electric ratepayers. WEC will apply for a loan to fund a construction work plan related to putting up a fiber optic communication network through most of our service territory.

In the July Board meeting, the WEC Board of Directors authorized the final preparation and submission of the application for the first phase of this loan. The network has the dual purpose to work with CUDs in our service territory to provide broadband to all our members, and to improve WEC internal communication infrastructure to provide more efficient and reliable electric service over the next decades with the potential for useful rate designs and management of customer usage.

We're looking for the best path forward toward those dual goals—for our members without adequate internet to have access to it if they choose, and to continue to upgrade WECs electric system for the 21st century of new technology, new weather patterns, and evolving expectations of many of our members. I like to think of it as win-win, but it's not without significant effort to plan, design, and carry out effectively.

It's a challenge, but worthwhile, because the benefits for our members will be huge. And it's part of our duty as a cooperative to recognize our members have needs not being met by private entities. In the same spirit as providing electric power when the investor owned utilities were not willing or ready to provide it to this area of Vermont, we take that same attitude about facilitating the provision of broadband with other partners, because we recognize it's a necessity for life in the 21st century for most of us.

## Capital credits coming in November

**Patty**: It is a function of cooperatives that we give back excess funds we collect from our membership that we don't need to pay bills or cover our lender ratios. In November, members will see bill credits, and former members no longer on our lines will receive checks. The Board authorized returning \$770,000 in credits in 2021. This will be distributed to members who were on our lines in 1996, 1997, and 2020, plus 2013 contributions in aid of

Steve: I think it's important to recognize that the amount you're credited depends on how much electricity you purchased that year. By a simple division per account it's about \$60, which may not seem like a lot. But does any other utility return funds year over year, other than cooperatives? It's really symbolic of what a cooperative does: it collects the money it's required to by its lending agencies, but returns what

is not used to operate its business back to the members. Members provide the amount needed to run the operation, and what isn't used in a given year can be returned those selfsame members.

I think when people get this refund, they should think of it as, 'this is what being a member of a community is all about.' It's not about profit. We collectively use what we need, and return what is the members' back to the members.

**Patty**: Speaking of community, I'll put in my annual plug for the

responsible for awarding grants and assisting the Communication Union Districts (CUDs) in their planning, development, and implementation of broadband projects.

Gov. Scott also appointed Dan Nelson, VP of Technology at VELCO, to the board. "Patty and Dan bring a vast amount of knowledge and experience to the Board and their commitment to the cause will be very beneficial to this effort," said Gov. Scott. "Connecting more Vermonters with broadband is critical to our work to grow the economy and workforce in all fourteen counties, and increasing economic equity from region to region. I'm very pleased to have such a talented team help lead this important initiative."

Previously, Gov. Scott appointed Christine Hallquist, who until 2018 led WEC's sister cooperative VEC, to serve as Executive Director of VCBB. Other board members include Holly Groschner, appointed by Speaker of the House Jill Kronowski; Brian Otley, appointed by the Vermont Senate Committee on Committees; and Rep. Laura Sibilia, appointed by the Vermont Communications Union Districts Association.

Community Fund. Every year, as we redistribute capital credits, we'll ask in advance for folks to donate their credits to the Community Fund. This fund gives grants to small nonprofits in our service area. These are the homegrown, small local groups that help us support central Vermont citizens and WEC members in terms of food access, health care, education, and other fundamental basic services. We are really proud of our Community Fund and we hope more folks who are able to do so will donate their credits to the Fund this year.

### Fall events canceled

#### Patty: Every

September we usually host an open house at our landfill gas-to-energy plant at Coventry, to complement the open house Casella hosts at the landfill. Casella decided not to do an open house this year due to pandemic concerns, and we decided to follow suit. In 2019 we had 400 people come through our plant, which is indoors with some enclosed spaces. We want to be able to safely welcome a lot of people to this event. The pandemic isn't over, and it just feels wise to wait.

**Steve**: For the same reasons, Patty has suggested we not have our usual October community meeting. We don't yet know how dangerous these variant

Patty: It's cooler in the mornings now. It's time to think about tightening up as cold temps will inevitably come our way.

We have incentives available through our Button Up program. These are a win win. When members use these incentives you get financial help to pay for new appliances, and your more efficient home or your new EV helps WEC meet regulation requirements. Efficiency Vermont has lots of incentives available, too.

Reach out to Member Services and they'll direct you.

Steve: I'm proud of WEC for continually recognizing and promoting the need to insulate your home as the best way to lower your energy costs. Our mission is to provide members with electricity, but that said, we recognize the best and usually the cheapest energy is the energy you don't have to use. We always encourage people to do what they can to insulate so you don't need to use as much propane, electric heaters, and the like, if you don't have to. And your house is more comfortable and usually healthier if it is well insulated.

## For Second Year in a Row, WEC Returns \$770,000 to Members

Co-op seeks former members owed refunds

n 2020, WEC returned \$770,000, the largest amount in its history, to its current and former members. In 2021, the Co-op Board voted to return the same sum. Unlike for-profit utilities, whose excess revenue goes to enrich shareholders, cooperatives return that money to their members. The way WEC does this is to credit current members' November electric bill, and mail a check to former members.

This year, the Board will refund eligible members on the Co-op's lines in years 1996, 1997, and 2020, plus 2013 contributions in aid of construction. Individual refunds may be reduced by any uncollectable or delinquent amounts owed to the Co-op, and no early retirements will be made to the estates of deceased members. Current members will see their refunds appear as a credit on their November 2021 bills.

Former members are entitled to receive refunds as well. In order to be eligible, former members must have a minimum \$20 capital credit distribution, and must submit an authorization form to the Co-op.

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Earlier this summer WEC mailed out Capital Credit Patronage Refund Authorizations former members. Listed below are the names of people or accounts whose authorizations were returned as undeliverable. If you know any person on this list or their rightful heirs, please have the former member or beneficiary contact Washington Electric Cooperative directly: 802-223-5245.

#### **Co-op Community Fund**

Approximately 14 percent of WEC members currently choose to donate their refunds to WEC's Community Fund. Any current or former member may direct their refund to the Community Fund as a one-time gift or in perpetuity.

The Community Fund supports small not for profits serving Central Vermont communities. The people served by these organizations are often WEC members. The full recipient list is in the July 2021 issue of Co-op Currents. A report on 2021 Community Fund activities will be published in Co-op Currents in 2022. 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## Capital Credits = your money, refunded. A pocket guide

- For-profit businesses are designed to make more money than they need to break even. Those revenues are profits. When not-for-profit cooperatives have excess revenues, those are called margins.
- As a member of the Co-op, you are a part owner. That means that the Co-op's margins belong to you, proportional to how much electricity you purchased.
- The Board decides how much money it can afford to return to the membership every year. If you are a current member, that money shows up as a credit on your November bill.
- If you move off WEC's lines, keep your address and phone up to date. WEC will continue to send a refund authorization form for you to complete.
- Whether you're a current or former member, you can donate your refund to WEC's Community Fund: wec.coop/community-fund-donations.

# In Marshfield, Youth Farmers Lead Climate Justice Movement

how up at the Grassroots Collective farm on a summer Thursday and ask for a picture, and the assembled team of highschoolers, agroecology mentors, and volunteers won't just smile for the camera while harvesting garlic and turning compost. They'll stop what they're doing to form a human pyramid.

What could be a better metaphor? They're working together to make something bigger than themselves, and judging by the laughter, they're having a pretty good time doing it.

The Grassroots Collective in Marshfield is a "collective of collectives," as organizer Henry Harris put it, a home base for building networks and structures of mutual support for people active in racial justice, climate justice, and regenerative agriculture.

The way folks linked to the Collective see it, these concepts are inextricably linked, and regenerative agriculture is the way through. "This is about tangible solutions to the climate crisis," Harris explained. Regenerative agriculture is a way of farming to reverse climate change by rebuilding healthy soil and waterways, using organic practices and methods like no tilling and rotational grazing. The Collective works to bring farmland access and ownership to racial groups systemically shut out of land ownership, supporting multiracial community building in rural Vermont while expanding farming practices that enrich the earth and provide healthy food to communities in need. These systems need to be developed now, said Harris, in order to mitigate or prevent deepening inequities as floods, droughts, and wildfires displace populations and increase competition for resources.

The Collective's abundant land on a former dairy farm on WEC's lines in Marshfield is a good lab. "We're creating cooperative opportunities," said Harris: while many people know a lot about regenerative agriculture, he said, they don't have the land to put it into practice. Sharing resources and experience allows folks to practice on an expanding scale. At the farm, youth leaders caught up with each other before agroecology mentor and herbalist Mollie Wills demonstrated how to harvest garlic. A small group discussed an Uprise! Camp exercise that involves climbing a tree by patiently scootching up a system of knotted ropes.

Now 18, Eliana Moorhead was one of 10 original youth members who farmed the land and were paid for their work. As the Northstar Collective, named for Harriet Tubman's guiding light and principle, they grow food crops and medicinal herbs for local marginalized communities, using farming as a tool to build antiracism and food security. Moorhead said she likes how the project centers leaders who are Black, Indigenous, and People of Color, and she likes that the food they grow goes to all kinds of people in need.

The initiative was originally funded through ShiftMeals, a food and economic security program sparked by the pandemic and led by WEC Board member Jean Hamilton and local restaurant chain The Skinny Pancake. That seed support was important, observed Moorhead, but the results healthy, organic food distribution to Migrant Justice farmworkers, Abenaki tribal members, food shelves, and others—were the work of the Northstar Collective. "We did the whole process of planting, harvesting, and delivering," she said.

On a tour of the farm, Moorhead talked about watching a collective form in real time. As the first 10 youth learned about regenerative farming, put their new skills to use, made decisions together, learned from mistakes, and celebrated gangbusters harvests, they taught new volunteers who showed up at the farm. Soon, the youth were each leading a team of volunteers. And as those volunteers learned, they gained

the skills to support new volunteers. "It's just passing the knowledge on to each other," she said. When no one is in charge, "it's less hierarchical and more fun that way."

Next to an old dairy barn, in a field with a new grant-funded greenhouse under construction, Moorhead points to lush salad veggies. "This was literally a field of sod with glacial boulders we had to dig out," she said. "This used to be a dairy farm. It wasn't equipped to be a vegetable farm, so we had to do a big switcheroo." Now, the Northstar Collective is growing indigenous varieties of squash and corn for the Abenaki Land Link project: the Nulhegan Band of the CoosukAbenaki Nation provides seeds, and all produce is delivered to Abenaki citizens in return.

Migrant Justice is also an important partner — especially because, said Moorhead, "they're farmworkers, and we are, too." In her description of the partnership, community building at every step is as important as the food. "Loading up the truck with my friends, driving up to [the Migrant Justice office in] Burlington, putting food in their fridge, asking how they're doing," she said. Migrant Justice delivers the produce on regular visits to migrant farmworkers on dairy farms, she said, and farmworker families put in special requests. "One woman loved making kale smoothies, so we'd drop off four bags of kale just for her. It's a way of getting to know people indirectly," she said.

Moorhead graduated from Montpelier High School this spring, and is taking a gap year before attending Oberlin College in 2022. Her plan is to farm in New Mexico, in an area where First Nation Puebla leaders are organizing for water justice. Farming and activism, she pointed out, are inextricable for her now. Each taken on its own, racial justice, climate catastrophe, and agricultural food systems are huge, complex, and daunting issues. Understanding how they intersect, she said, "is both sad, and it's amazing." Amazing, she said, because she's discovered she can work in spaces that positivelyand urgently-move the needle on all of these at the same time. "Now I understand what my priorities are. This continued on page 7

already has grant funding secured, said Pelletier. It's based on WEC's service area, and Pelletier described it as a network "that extends from CVFiber to ECFiber through NEK Broadband. These three CUDs cover about 900 miles. About 500 is CVFiber territory," he explained, demonstrating the efficiency of working in partnership with multiple CUDs.

Another component to the project preconstruction activities is "make-ready" work, which Pelletier described as actually making space on each pole to hang fiber cable. In addition, some pole work must be done: pole replacement, erecting midspan poles in areas with long gaps between poles.

And then, construction can begin.

#### The construction process

With all the preconstruction work happening now, WEC and CVFiber plan to be ready to build out fiber, and begin connecting subscribers, as soon as possible. "As soon as the fiber starts getting on the poles, we'll start lighting those poles," pledged Pelletier. While the work up through construction is sequential, he said, it isn't as though all the fiber needs to be hung before a switch is flipped, bringing internet to all subscribers at once. Instead, "parallel to the construction, just lagging by a bit, is the ability to bring subscribers online." In addition, he pointed out, WEC members who choose to subscribe to CVFiber high speed internet will later also be connected with digital meters using fiber for communication to and from WEC.

While CVFiber hopes for speedy construction, much of that speed is contingent on RUS funding coming through and the availability of materials and contact labor. "There's such a demand nationwide, since the federal government is pumping billions of dollars into rural netrification," he said. To shore against these shortages, Pelletier said, groups are discussing consortiums to buy supplies at bulk or even statewide levels. And, he said, the industry is hungry for people trained to construct fiber, and folks can access scholarships and grants to get the training that qualifies them for these jobs that pay well.

But if funding, materials, and labor come through as planned, CVFiber's plan is to halve the number of households with substandard internet in its district by the end of 2022. That would require hanging about 300 miles of fiber. Another 300 miles in 2023 would make affordable high speed internet available to 80 percent of those underserved today. By 2024, internet would reach 95 percent of those who lack it now.

The folks served through this construction are largely WEC members, said Pelletier. "Anyplace without a cable is underserved, which basically describes the ratepayers of WEC," he said. "Our interests are significantly aligned in doing this as efficiently, cost effectively, and quickly as possible. What WEC did in the 1930s and 1940s, that's us. We're delivering the internet to rural customers."



#### "Useful in our community"

Back at the farmhouse by the harvested garlic field, Henry Harris drank coffee and checked in with Moorhead and others as a farm dog trotted by carrying a freshly killed groundhog. Recently injured, Harris sat on a knee scooter, sporting a pink cast covered in names and messages. Harris ran through several projects and partnerships associated with the Grassroots Collective, all operating at the intersections of racial justice, climate justice, and agriculture. Moorhead talked about a recent trip to visit Ange Gibbons, founder of EarthWalk, and learn from her about rotational grazing and tincture making. "It's nice to have here as a home base and go out and learn," from other farmers, she said. She also liked seeing connections between different initiatives-for example, between summer camp and a project to expand **BIPOC** land ownership in communities throughout Vermont.

In the meantime, there are physical projects underway: with Vermont Land Trust funding, the Collective is reconstructing the old dairy barn's milk house in order to have a space to make value-added food products and

to host conferences. "It's a hyper-local little food hub here," said Harris.

And that's the point. While the issues the Collective addresses are massive and global, the entire concept of grassroots organizing is about face to face interactions. Everyone on the farm was unrushed and having fun. Taking a break from harvest to build a human pyramid with friends. Learning from experience in the fields, learning from each other, allowing room for mistakes, welcoming new volunteers and friends. "We're really trying to get established to be used and useful in our community," Harris said. "We're chipping away at it. Stop by! Mostly, we want to make friends."

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# When Switching to an EV, Be Prepared for a Few Surprises

hank you for the article on EV charging [June 2021]. When I bought my used EV about a year ago Bill Powell and Dan Weston were enormously helpful in assisting me through the process. Like many other utilities, WEC provided a charger at no cost, plus a rebate that mostly covered the cost of the installation. I thought I knew what I was jumping into but there were still some surprises.

First, many of the rebates only apply to new vehicles. It's also important to note the new-car-only federal tax credit is only as helpful as your tax liability and the any-EV WEC rebate is taxable and reportable as income. The process to obtain and install the charger, by design, lagged behind the purchase by a couple of months, necessitating the use of public charging in the interim. For these reasons I recommend purchase during the spring or summer so your home charger can be in place in time for colder weather.

The next surprise was the public charging network. Without using public chargers your range is essentially half the stated range, since you still have to return home to recharge. I found there are multiple networks for public charging and each has its own unique pricing structure, access, etc. Some are free, some charge for parking but not for energy, some just the opposite, and some charge for everything. Many public chargers rely on wifi to initiate the charging session.

Then I needed to learn to plan my trips and anticipate my need to charge. Since meaningful charging can take 2-4 hours or more, it's a lot different than stopping by the gas station for a few minutes and getting right back on the road. Public chargers are not always convenient to your destination — or anything; this can be tricky depending on weather and purpose.

Finally, winter. My range plummeted by half and the recommendation is to keep the car plugged in, for battery conditioning and optimal battery life, whenever the temperature dropped below freezing; pretty much all the time throughout the winter. With range cut in half by temperature and reduced half again by home charging, you can travel out only about a quarter of the stated range. This is not insurmountable but can be challenging. And, the cost to keep my battery cozy doubled my electric bill. While electric pricing is less volatile than gas, it was still a shock.

Overall I like my EV. I like that charging on the WEC system means I'm charging green. As a primary vehicle, however, my EV is undeniably limited.

### From Bill Powell, the Energy Coach:

The range anxiety Monique cites is legitimate, and varies with each EV driver's primary purpose (eg: commuting) and the way they drive. Range anxiety is a concern for some EV drivers, but not all. Range anxiety is decreasing as battery capacity is increasing, as is the distribution of public charging equipment.

Defining efficiency as miles per kilowatt hour consumed, EV mileage is a straightforward indicator reflecting the driving behavior of the EV owner. The more carefully you drive, the higher your mileage per kWh.

For example, the Chevrolet Bolt claims 259 miles of range for its 66 kWh battery. 259 divided by 66 is 3.9 miles per kWh consumed. My Bolt average is 5.1 miles per kWh, or 31 percent higher than the manufacturer's estimate. That's high in part because my daily use — commuting to the WEC office and local travel — avoids highways.

I haven't had much winter experience, but it is a fact the mileage per kWh drops as the cabin comfort energy use increases (heating or cooling). Then, if the EV is parked outside in winter, it draws more to keep the high voltage battery "warm" and fully charged.

Like Monique, as a fellow EV driver, I find the pros of driving an electric vehicle outweigh the cons. But it's a new technology for many of us, and requires a shift in habits and expectations. I appreciate any member who chimes in in the pages of *Co-op Currents* to further expand on the EV driving experience.
