Place-based Education for Everybody

WEC's Community Fund supports a gazillion years of Naturalist Journeys at North Branch Nature Center in Montpelier

or as long as anyone at North Branch Nature Center can remember, Washington Electric Co-op has sponsored the popular Naturalist Journeys program through regular donations from the member-supported Community Fund. "Thank you for the gazillion years of support. I think that's the accurate number," smiled executive director Naomi Heindel.

On a summer Friday, ten days after historic flooding inundated the Nature Center's trails and community garden and wiped out a farm road, Heindel was also appreciative of an opportunity for unexpected extra support. The Co-op's Community Fund committee had just decided to offer \$1,000 grants to nonprofits impacted by the flood. Heindel had just applied.

Even with the infrastructure damage, she observed, in some ways it was a good thing that North Branch Nature Center was saturated. "We see one of our primary roles as stewarding our 28 acres. That is top of mind for me right now because we are on a floodplain," she explained, situated on the North Branch of the Winooski River just above downtown Montpelier. "Our fields and forests really did their part in soaking up the floodwaters headed to Montpelier and beyond. They're still soaked, as they should be." The area North Branch Nature

Center covers is small, but important, she said. Replanting riparian areas, tackling invasive species, and building climate resilience is all part of the plan. And with trails that connect to Hubbard Park on one side and North Branch River Park on the other, offering both education and respite to the people that enjoy the Nature Center is also part of the plan. "We see ourselves as an important link in outdoor recreation in Montpelier and in maintaining that green space for plants, animals, floodwaters, and people alike," Heindel said.

Connecting people and nature

The mission of North Branch Nature Center is connecting people with the natural world. Heindel is proud that they offer a wide variety of ways for people to find their point of connection. "If you don't plan your programs intentionally, you can look back and realize all your programs required being outdoors, needing to walk, listening to an expert, and were one day long," she said. That model doesn't take into account the diversity of abilities, interests, and schedules of their audience. In addition to diverse options, she added, "it's important to not associate any type of value judgment to any

Historic Floods in Central Vermont; WEC Offers Community Fund Flood Response Grants

n July 9, towering purple and black thunderheads sat over Central Vermont, crackling with lightning and dumping hard rain. The next day, July 10, prolonged, torrential rain caused the worst flooding Vermont has seen since Tropical Storm Irene, and in many areas, since 1927. The next day, July 11, state officials watched Wrightsville Dam with concern as water rose within a foot of reaching the spillway, which would have sent more water into catastrophically flooded downtown Montpelier. WEC owns the generation plant at Wrightsville Dam, and had to temporarily shut it down due

The State of Vermont owns and manages the dam and its flood control mechanisms.

Washington Electric Co-op's lines did not incur much damage from the storm. "It's because we don't serve any downtowns," explained General Manager Louis Porter. "Our rural, offroad system, which makes us so vulnerable to winter storms, actually protected us this time." In the July storm, developed areas, where waterways and infrastructure converge, were hit the worst. Many towns in WEC's service area were among those categorized by Vermont Emergency Management as

President's and General Manager's Message

WEC Infrastructure Tolerates Catastrophic Flooding; Excess Solar Threatens Substation

Regulators' order requiring an income-qualified reduction system calls into question Co-op's ability to self-govern

WEC's flood response, outages

Louis: Our poles and wires were not too badly affected by the initial storm on July 10 that caused catastrophic statewide flooding. We had about 1,100 members out. We did, however, have a pretty major outage the following Thursday and Friday, July 13 and 14, with 2,000 members out. They went out between 3:00 and 4:00 in the afternoon and we had them back on by 10 the next morning.

We had five poles go out in a landslide in Chelsea. The main issue throughout our territory was crews didn't have road access. **Steve:** Having roads washed out is a terrible disruption and impediment to restoring service. Fortunately in this case, WEC's crews are experienced and equipped in having to work in our rural territory. I'm proud of them.

Louis: Yeah, but that's a double-edged sword. This was a rare instance in which our territory actually benefited us. Most flooding was in village centers and towns, and our territory is rural. Municipal utilities like Hardwick, Johnson, Ludlow, all had major problems mostly concentrated in their downtowns.

Steve: The larger context of all this is resilience to future storms and overall reliability. If flooding is becoming a decadal challenge, are there additional issues we're going to have to pay more attention to? Is flooding going to have to cause us to reevaluate our strategic resiliency efforts?

Louis: Underground wiring is made to withstand water and moisture. BED [Burlington Electric Department] had few if any outages, and their system is largely underground. They kindly offered to send us crews because they had so few outages, though we ended up not needing them.

Steve: I wonder about functional differences in preparing for and responding to challenges from floods, as opposed to everyday challenges, like winter weather and trees.

Louis: I will say it's something we'll need to consider as we look at moving lines to the roadside, because there was a tremendous amount of damage to the road systems in the state. Generally, we had less damage than I would have expected, given the damage to the roads in our territory.

Our line crew members know our territory extremely well. We received feedback from a couple of members expressing gratitude to our crews for how quickly they were able to get the power back on, when all the roads were washed out.

Steve: Apart from our crews not being able to get from one place to another, do we have to shut people off while roads are being repaired?

Louis: Yes. As repairs are made

One more thing I would like our members to understand. The effects of storms, including this storm, on our system and the power grid, continue after storms end. In this case, we need to make some permanent repairs where we've made temporary fixes. It takes a little bit of time.

PUC orders WEC to plan income-qualified reduction system

Louis: The PUC [Public Utility Commission] recently issued an order for Washington Electric to come up with a plan for an income-qualified bill reduction system in our territory.

I often say "income-eligible rates," but it's not really a rate. It's a bill credit. That may seem like a distinction without a difference, but it does make a difference for WEC. That's because if we were to implement such a system, it will be a surcharge on bills other members pay in exchange for a bill credit for members who qualify.

Typically this would look like a surcharge on members' bills, like the Efficiency Vermont charge. It would apply to net meterers as well. Members who are income-qualified for a reduction will see a credit on their bills instead of a surcharge.

Two utilities in Vermont, Burlington Electric Department and Green Mountain Power, have incomequalified bill reduction systems in place now. Washington Electric has long argued that if the state is going to mandate an income-qualifying reduction in electric bills, it should be a statewide system. The reason we've argued that is because some territories, including ours, have a larger share of income-qualifying members than other territories. We've always felt a statewide program was

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near power lines, we need to cut off power so highway crews can safely do their job.

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But the order was issued. We have six months to return to the PUC with a plan for what we propose to develop. We're not yet sure what we'll propose. There will certainly be a public comment period after that.

Steve: A goal of ratemaking is for a utility to recover its operation costs while fairly distributing those costs

among its customers and incentivizing ratepayers' behavior toward goals beneficial to both them and society. Such incentives have changed over the past few decades.

An income-qualified system would provide some relief to some members of the Co-op. As Louis mentioned, under this order, other members would cover the cost. It isn't clear yet what the resulting rate increase would be.

Louis: For reasons I don't fully understand, we are the only utility without a system already in place that was singled out and asked to develop such a system.

Steve: The order said we have the highest rates of any utility in Vermont, so perhaps

some people see that as punitive to low-income members. Our territory is rural, wooded, and predominantly residential; the average cost to provide power per customer is higher here than elsewhere.

About five years ago the PUC approved our current rate design, which raised the fixed monthly charge each member pays and simultaneously lowered the rate per kilowatt hour. That was to incentivize our members' use of WEC's renewable electricity over high-emission fossil fuels, aligning with several state goals as well as the Co-op's own environmental values.

Louis: Right. The rate design was revenue-neutral. The Co-op took in no more money after the change

Steve: We know that an unavoidable monthly charge is burdensome to some members. The idea is to offset it with lower rates per kilowatt hour.

Louis: WEC had pre-existing programs and projects in place to support incomeeligible members before this order. We provide weatherization and incentives to our members, and partner with community action agencies to best reach those who can benefit from these incentives. We're partnering with Vermont Electric Co-op on a solar program that uses federal funding to reduce income-eligible

members' bills.

Steve: WEC has a history of working with appropriate agencies to attempt to lower both emissions and bills. We have always believed the cheapest kilowatt hour is the one you don't have to use.

Louis: That brings up something important, Steve. There seems to be an assumption in the order that income-qualified members use less electricity. We know that's often not the case. People who are incomequalified tend to live in homes that are older, less weatherized, have older appliances, and have electric heat. All those things increase power use. If part of the assumption of the order is that low-income members use less electricity, that often does not seem to be borne out.

Steve: We looked into this in 2017 when we were studying rate redesign. I recall, somewhat to the surprise of some of us, we didn't find much correlation between member income and electric use per month. We don't have clear evidence to show that most income-qualified members are also low-electricity users who are penalized by a higher monthly charge and lower kilowatt per hour rates any more than others.

So this order is part of a larger issue regarding regulation vs. self-governance. That is: to what extent do electric cooperatives retain the leeway and authority to act in the interests of all their members, and to do so equitably, as long as we fulfill our mission?

Threat to Jackson Corner substation

Louis: Over the last year, Washington Electric has done some detailed engineering work on our system. This thorough assessment is driven mainly by our need for a new construction work plan and long-range system plan.

What we discovered is all of our substations are out of balance in terms of load to distributed generation. There's a higher amount of solar production compared to power used on our system, substation by substation, than there should be. That can be a problem in terms of backfeed and potential risk to the grid.

More concerning than that is what's happening at the Jackson Corner substation. That sub hosts two large solar arrays allowed by the state's Standard Offer programs. WEC doesn't take power from them, but moves the power onto the grid. The sub is handling too much power, which leads to thermal overload, as well as being out of balance. Of course, net metering systems on that substation also contribute to the problem.

What that means practically is that the transformers and other equipment at the Jackson Corner substation are at risk of damage or failure. We plan on rebuilding the sub entirely in our next cycle of borrowing from our federal lenders, the Rural Utility Service program of the USDA, and our new Construction Work Plan. However, it will take several years to get the financing, materials, design, and to reconstruct it. In the meantime, WEC will request the PUC not allow additional distributed generation linked to that sub until we can get it rebuilt. That means that as generation projects are proposed, whether standard offer, net metering, or other, we have to file objections with the

PUC because of the risk it creates for the sub and our ability to provide safe and reliable power to our membership.

The substation structure at Jackson Corner is a wooden pole structure. It can't take additional transformers. Because of supply chain delays, it would take just as long to increase the size of the transformers as it would to completely rebuild the sub, and a full rebuild is what we intend to do.

Steve: Louis made the point that the relative magnitude of the problem depends on two Standard Offer projects hooked up to our setup.

Large distributed generation projects place demands on our infrastructure when they are not co-located with additional load. These are relatively expensive to address and require going to regulators to allow us to invest in upgrades.

Louis: While it's true that the Jackson Corner substation has two Standard Offer projects on it, all the others are overloaded from a distributed generation to load perspective. Even if one residence's net metering generation-to-load balances out over the course of a year, on sunny summer and fall days, generation from multiple solar projects overload each of our substations.

Steve: A challenge is that policies and incentives in Vermont have not evolved to keep up with the large amount of intermittent distributed generation, primarily solar power, in some territories, including WEC's. All members have to pay for much of the infrastructure upgrades and maintenance needed to ensure people still have reliable electricity even with the amount of solar on the system.

"Load" is the utility term for how much electric power appliances or components use when they're running. If there is an imbalance between the load present on a portion of the system and the generation supplied to it, the electrical infrastructure can be harmed.

Imagine a water tank with a pipe feeding water into it. Some people dip water out of the tank, and others add more water to the tank with buckets. If more water goes into the tank than is dipped out, it can force water back up the pipe, risking system components.

Co-op Seeks Former Members for Capital Credit Refunds

WEC has returned almost \$10 million to members since 1998

hen your electric cooperative takes in more money than it costs to run the utility, where does that money go?

Have you ever noticed a credit on your November electric bill? As a member of an electric cooperative, excess revenue is returned to you and your fellow member-owners. That is a major difference between shareholder-owned utilities and cooperatively-owned utilities: When for-profit utilities collect excess revenue, those profits enrich their shareholders. But members of cooperative utilities get excess revenue back over time in the form of capital credit refunds. Since 1998, WEC has returned almost \$10 million in capital credit refunds to Co-op members.

This year, the Board will refund a total of \$400,000 to eligible members who were on the Co-op's lines in years 1998, 2013, and 2022. Individual refunds may be reduced by any uncollectable or delinguent amounts owed to the Co-op. New in 2023, the Co-op may offer conditional early retirements to the estates of deceased members or their heirs. Contact Rosie Casciero for more information at 802-224-2322. Refunds will appear as a credit on current members' November 2023 bills.

Former members are entitled to receive refunds as well. In order to be eligible,

former members must have a minimum \$50 capital credit distribution, and must submit an authorization form to the Co-op. In July, WEC mailed Patronage Capital Credit Refund Authorization forms to former members. Those forms are due back September 29, 2023.

program. There's just as much value in someone connecting through an immersive weekend program on sedges or moss as there is in someone who comes on a paddle, or for a nature romp, or campfire, or nature journaling workshop. We want to make sure we offer all those entry points."

North Branch Nature Center is now focused on actively reaching communities that have been historically excluded from participating in nature education. These are the same communities, Heindel pointed out, that are impacted most by the climate crisis and socioeconomic injustice. Members of Central Valley Family and Friends United (CVFUN), a social organization for adult members of the developmental disabilities community, enjoy regular outings to the Nature Center. Staff naturalists join members of the Northeast Disabled Athletics Association to bring nature education to inclusive kayaking excursions in the Champlain Islands. The Nature Center also dedicates a certain number of summer and spring break camp spots to families served by the Central Vermont Refugee Action Network, and will host the network's annual picnic.

Other new partnerships include organizations celebrating and supporting body positivity and queer identities, including Rainbow Bridge Community Center in Barre, the Vermont chapter of the Body Liberation Outdoor Club, and Outright Vermont. These new partnerships have opened up joyful connections – Heindel, who served as the naturalist on an inclusive kayaking trip, said it was a fantastic experience – and, she added, she's seen visitors who first come with a new partner organization return for other Nature Center programs.

History of land use

"When you learn to appreciate and connect to any place, it then teaches you to appreciate and connect with all places," said Heindel, describing the importance of the place-based nature education practiced at North Branch Nature Center. This past year, a special Naturalist Journeys program dived into the history of the Nature Center land itself.

Naturalist Journeys – the program supported by Washington Electric Co-op members through their donations to the Community Fund – is one of the Nature Center's oldest and most beloved programs. Natural scientists share the stories of wildlife they've encountered in travels, or discuss their environmental research. "It's a chance to dive in deep to a place and understand its interconnections," explained Heindel, and the program is generally offered in winter and early spring, when Vermonters tend to feel particularly cooped up. The program pivoted to a virtual model during the early years of the COVID pandemic, and is now offered in a hybrid in-person/virtual format.

Landscape historian Samantha Ford researched the land use of the Nature Center's footprint over the last 230 years or so and brought it to life in a Naturalist Journeys presentation on March 15, 2023. Ford, of Turn Stone Research, focuses on colonial and postcolonial land use history. The land was cleared by settlers moving north from Massachusetts in the 1790s, Ford discovered, and farmed for hundreds of years. Morgan horses were once bred on the property. In the late 1800s, a woman owned and farmed the land; a rarity. "[Ford]'s absolutely masterful at digging up history, looking up old deeds, newspaper records, archival info, interpreting that, and then turning it into a story. She was able to present to us about people being born, living here, dying here, the size of the farm," said Heindel. "It deepens our appreciation of the space and to keep it open. This land has been a working landscape for hundreds of years. As we're stewarding it, we can think of all the people that came before us." The Nature Center plans to install interpretive panels on the property featuring these newly uncovered stories.

One solution

Even while trails were still underwater, North Branch Nature Center staff were still looking forward to their to-do lists. "We are just putting finishing touches on a new universal access trail," said Heindel, and are developing signs for a new nature connection interpretive trail. "Once it dries out, I would love to have folks who haven't been here, or who have but it's been a long time, swing by, say hi, go for a walk, sit on a bench and look at the birds. There are going to be new, accessible and exciting things here," she promised.

That's not just optimism, but finding pragmatic solutions in climate instability. New accessible or instructive nature trails are just as strategic as planting native species in a riparian zone

upstream of a catastrophically flooded capital. "Nature connection is really important for mental health and social well being," explained Heindel. "A kid who comes to one of our programs for even one afternoon a week is spending that afternoon without screens and the pressure that comes with them. We are the antidote to that."

social, racial, and economic injustice and inequality, Heindel suggested, we need places that support healthy communities and landscapes. "It's not the only solution, but it's our answer," she said. "This nature center, and truly all the nature centers out there, are a really important piece of the puzzle of how we take care of the planet and how we take care of ourselves and our communities."

When climate change events and biodiversity loss coincides with

ASK THE ENERGY COACH

Is there an industry standard for EV charging connectors?

Dear Energy Coach: I am buying an EV, and I want to know where I can charge it. Can I charge a non-Tesla at a Tesla charging station now? Why isn't there an industry standard for this stuff?



et's start now and then look to the future. Yes: an industry standard is emerging, and it looks like it's the North American Charging

Standard, or NACS. That's the EV charge connector developed by Tesla. There are several reasons for that, but it's generally accepted to be easier to handle and to provide a faster charge cycle - thereby providing a better experience for you.

Most other EV manufacturers used the Combined Charging System (CCS) connector, but Ford is switching to NACS. Meanwhile, Tesla is modifying its Supercharger charging network so EV drivers can charge with non-Tesla connector adapters.

I agree with you that an industry standard is a good thing. Standards will enable more consumer choices of charging options. What I mean is that the tech is moving out of the wall and into the vehicle: bidirectional charging, which I discussed in the last issue, will become part of the charger, and not something the EV driver has to install separately. It's similar with batteries. If EV manufacturers promote using batteries for uses other than driving - and they are starting to, with awareness around bidirectional charging and using EVs as backup power sources – then the battery, and the tech protecting it, is becoming part of the manufacturer's scope.

So it's not just about using the Supercharger network at the grocery store. It means that as the standard develops, you won't need extra boxes installed at your house and all the additional charges associated with that. The box will be in the vehicle. And that opens up accessibility and choices, especially when bidirectional charging becomes prevalent.

One more thing. If you're planning to install a Level 2 charger for that new EV, call WEC first to see if you can handle the additional load, or if you need to get on the list for upsizing your transformer. You can certainly charge with a Level 1 charger - which uses a standard 110 volt outlet - in the meantime.

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Safety Minute: Preventing Electrical Hazards in a Wet Basement

Electrical safety tips from Safety and Environmental Compliance Specialist David Young

he July floods inundated many Vermont basements with feet of water and mud. Even when there's not historic flooding, many basements tend to get damp or wet during rainy seasons and the spring thaw.

The problem is, basements flood, and electrical panels and electrical equipment are often stored in the basement. The combination of electricity and water can damage your equipment

and is dangerous. Specifically, being wet lowers the resistance of the human body to electric shock, and increases the likelihood of injury.

First, if you see any water at all in the basement, be cautious. Wear shoes so your feet do not become the path of a current. Rubber boots are ideal.

If you have an underground installation, sometimes water will enter the house through the electric conduit. The wires are insulated, but even if the conduit is glued, water can get in and goes to the lowest point: your

If you need to quickly shut off power to your full house, there's a plan B. You may have an external breaker, and it's designed for homeowners to switch off and on. Here's where to look:

- If your service entrance comes to a meter socket outside your house, look underneath for a breaker.
- If your service entrance is underground, look out at your pole for your

electrical equipment that's anything plugged in, including your furnace your equipment should be okay. If the water is rising, take the precaution of shutting off your electrical equipment. If you shut off the power, some equipment may still be functional after it dries, even if it was

breaker.

 Sometimes the breaker is on a pedestal - a short pole with a meter and breaker on it - in between your pole and your house.

Here's your safety checklist:

- Plan ahead. Go down to your basement and take a quick scan of the equipment you have down there. Think about what you can and can't move, and what might need to be unplugged. Locate your external breaker.
- If you can, install a sump pump. Make sure the control panel is well above any expected flood level. If you already have a pump, make sure it works.
- When your basement is wet, put on rubber boots or shoes before entering it. Don't touch any wires.
- If water is likely to submerge your equipment, shut off electrical equipment that you can't move or raise higher.
- If you need to shut off equipment and can't get to your breaker box safely, shut off power to your house via your external breaker.

having major flood damage, including Montpelier and East Montpelier, Barre, Cabot, Calais, Marshfield, and most of Orange County.

Much of that damage was road damage, and road damage did create obstacles for WEC crews. Between 1,100-1,200 members lost power due to the storm; lineworkers reached many of those outage points by all-terrain vehicles or other offroad means. Some members experienced intentional outages later, when power was shut off on certain stretches to allow for highway departments to safely repair

ur partners at Capstone (capstonevt.org) recommend the following steps to access resources to Vermonters affected by flood damage.

- Call 211 for access to emergency resources.
- Insurance: Contact your homeowners' or renters' insurance company to file a claim

washed out roads.

Because so many members, friends, and neighbors are facing enormous and immediate need as a result of flood damage, the Board committee that manages WEC's Community Fund quickly decided to offer immediate \$1,000 grants to impacted nonprofits in WEC territory.

- USDA 504 Home Repair: Federal home repair loans are available for income-qualified members.
- ٠ Forbearance: Contact your creditors to inquire about forbearance for mortgage payments, auto loans, credit card bills, student loan repayment, or other loans if you were financially impacted by the flood disaster.
- When you are rebuilding and replacing devices, contact Capstone and ٠ Efficiency Vermont for weatherization incentives and equipment rebates to make your home safer and more resilient. Low- to no-interest financing is available.
- For financial and energy coaching support, contact Capstone at capstonevt.org or Northeast Kingdom Community Action at nekcavt.org.
